Course Description

The course is devoted to studying American literature from the colonial period to the late twentieth century. Because much of the early literature is nonfiction (diaries, letters, sermons, almanacs, speeches, and foundational documents), there are many opportunities to analyze historical and informational texts. Throughout the year, students have opportunities to make connections with history, art, and other subjects. Essays range from the analytical to the creative: students might write a narrative essay in the style of Thoreau's Walden or compare the treatment of a given theme in works from different genres. Students build on their writing skills from previous years, integrating multiple sources and perspectives into their work, reading literary criticism, and writing longer and more complex essays. Class fee \$25 for year.

Course Expectations

- 1. Write informative research essays that incorporate internal citations, direct quotes, utilize primary and secondary sources, and include a works cited page.
- 2. Analyze and evaluate elements and themes of fiction and nonfiction literature.
- 3. Interpret and formulate judgments about a piece of literature and support those judgments with convincing, textual evidence.
- 4. Effectively engage in group discussions.
- 5. Advance language and vocabulary skills critical to college and career readiness.

School-wide Expectations

Google Classroom

Passes & Tardies

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Passes will not be given to students in the 5 minutes in the beginning nor the 5 minutes at the end of the class period except in extreme circumstances. Passes to the restroom/water fountain will be given to one student at a time. Please limit the amount of time you are out of class by going to the restroom/water fountain during the passing period. You must have your ID to receive a pass out of class unless there is an emergency situation.



Preparedness

Please bring all necessary supplies and assignments to class each day. When you enter the classroom, sit in your assigned seat and begin bellwork immediately.



Electronic Devices

All students have been provided a Chromebook. Any technology use will be limited to the Chromebook. All personal cell phones, headphones, etc. should be in your bag and out of sight. Please be sure to silence all devices before putting them away. Students will be expected to handle their assigned Chromebook in accordance with school norms and procedures.



Attendance

Students are strongly encouraged to attend class regularly. If a student has an excused absence it is the student's responsibility to complete any assignment, quiz or exam that was missed. Per Arizona Revised Statute 15-802, 15-803, a student who is absent from any given class 10% or more either excused or unexcused, per year may not receive academic credit for that class.

School-wide Academic Policies

School-wide Late Work Policy

Late work is defined as any work completed and turned in after a designated due date. Late work will be accepted up to TWO DAYS AFTER THE DESIGNATED DUE DATE FOR THE WORK. Extended time may be given due to extenuating circumstances such as major family illness, car accidents, etc. However, NO LATE WORK will be accepted one week prior to the end of the quarter.

School-wide Make Up Work Policy

Make up work is defined as any assignments or tests students need to complete due to an excused absence. Students will be allowed the same amount of days equal to the number of excused absence days to make up assignments for full credit.

Suggested Supplies

Texts: Students will be provided with a grade-level textbook paid for by the student course fee. Over the course of the year students will engage with a number of contemporary and classic novels, poetry, drama, and nonfiction sources. Texts will be provided, but students are welcome to purchase their own copy if they would like to be able to annotate the text or read at home.

• A note about our reading materials: Juniors will be reading a variety of fiction and nonfiction, some of which may contain topics and language of a sensitive nature, such as violence, death, racism, and sexism. We at Paradise Honors High School do not endorse these ideas and concepts, and these instances are infrequent. All texts are recommended by the Common Core State Standards Initiative for Grades 11-12 and/or the College Board. Should you have any questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact me.
